Aiming Higher

I've just finished reading "Christendom – The Triumph of a Religion, AD 300 – 1300" by Peter Heather. Its 587 pages of fairly dense reading, by the chair of Medieval History at King's College, London.

Our faith story is amazing, inspiring, at times discouraging, and at times brutal. It includes martyrs, missionaries, saints, (like Francis of Assisi), rulers, like Good King Wenceslas, (who was for real and lost his life being good), as well as Crusades, Inquisition, and eventually a Church trying for rigid control. Some 200 years later a monk named Luther emerged, and Christendom took another turn.

So, especially in this month of Reformation, it is appropriate to think of what God wants us to be as Church and how, by grace and in faith, we try to be what the Spirit of God inspires and calls us to be today.

I've begun another book entitled "Grace" by Cody Keenan the chief White House speechwriter for President Obama. Now, before you say, "Pastor, you must be kidding! This ties in to what you wrote above?" Well, stay with me, and let's see.

As President Obama prepared to head for the 50th Anniversary of the events at the Edmund Pettis Bridge in Selma, Alabama (events that gave life to the Civil Rights movement), Keenan and he worked on the remarks he would say there.

Obama said, "Selma is about each of us asking ourselves what we can do to make America better. That's the American story. Not just scratching for what was or settling for what is – but imagining what might be. *Insisting* we live up to

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our highest ideals."

"There's always been a tension between those high ideals of our founding and how short we fall of them. We're at our best when we mind that tension. When we work to close that gap. Because we believe we can. *That's* what makes America exceptional."

Do you see the connection? Whether we are thinking about America, or thinking about the Church, are we living out what we say we believe? Are we willing to feel the tension between where we are right now as a congregation and individual Christians, compared with where we know that God is calling us to be? Is it enough to know that as Americans we say that all have the right to "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness", but then we just don't want to hear about some folks being denied this? Is it enough in Church to confess what we believe, but then not to ask ourselves how we are living this out in the world and sharing it with others? If we are willing to ask hard questions about ourselves, our Church, or our nation, and then to move in good and Godly directions, perhaps this is being exceptional as the above quote suggests.

When unarmed men, women and children were attacked on the Edmund Pettis Bridge in Selma by armed police, much of America watched news clips of this event with horror. This was not what they believed America should be. So, many joined the movement for reform, for civil rights, for a better country.

In our church today, do we desire only to be comforted, to keep things the same and familiar, to take a "whatever will be, will be" attitude? Or, are we constantly asking how we can tell others about Jesus and how today and in the years to come we can keep proclaiming the Gospel? That takes hard work! That will take prayer and possibly sacrifice. If church, and possibly America, is only a place where we can get something out of it for ourselves today, then we have taken a cultural turn (there's a lot of that feeling out there today) that doesn't live out the high ideals that we confess.

We are people who live by grace. There is a creative tension with who we are and who we know we should be. I feel that tension within myself. It is often not comfortable. Yet, God can use it to help me become more of the person and pastor that God wants me to be .That's why God's grace is so

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wonderful! God loves us where we are but wants us to continue to become all that we can be.

This month we meet again St. Francis (at the beginning of the month on October 4) and Martin Luther (at the end of the month). Two individual Christians, very different, but both committed to serving God and others. Both wanted to serve Jesus and both sacrificed to do that. As with so many who have gone before us, we stand on their shoulders and are inspired by their example to grow in God's grace and love. To be all God intends us to be.

Feel free to bring lawn chairs or blankets

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
WHEN ANIMALS BLESS US


