September 21 is the day appointed in the Church Year to remember Matthew, Apostle and Evangelist. (Please note that his former occupation as a tax collector for the Roman government, is not in the title. This is as *it* should be, since Jesus invited Matthew to imagine what could be.) However, former tax collector is quickly remembered in the Gospel of Matthew reading appointed for the day.

**"As Jesus passed on** from there, he saw a man called Matthew sitting at the tax office; and he **said to him, "Follow me."** And he rose and followed him.

And as he sat at table in the house, behold, many tax collectors and sinners came and sat down with Jesus and his disciples. And when the Pharisees saw this, they said to his disciples, "Why does your teacher eat with tax collectors and sinners." But when he (Jesus) heard it, he said, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick. Go and learn what this means, 'I desire mercy and not sacrifice.' For I came not to call the righteous, but sinners."

If you were a tax collector, you worked for Herod Antipas, a ruler allowed to rule by the Romans. Rome, occupied Palestine

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and considered it a part of the Roman Empire. As a defeated nation, taxes needed to be paid to the Romans and one of the primary needs for these taxes was to support the Roman army. So, not only were you reminded by the presence of the soldiers that you were a conquered nation, you had to help pay for them being there.

As a Jewish man working for the Romans, collecting money to help keep the occupation going, and making a good living by cheating people in the process, you did not make many friends, except perhaps, fellow tax collectors and "other sinners". Well, Matthew had made the decision to do this and, like it or not, this was his life. That is, until he met Jesus.

I think that Jesus not only sees us as we are, but also imagines how we can be. We may have trouble seeing ourselves differently, but Jesus can imagine for us and in his invitation, "follow me", invites us to dream and act anew. Scripture tells us this is not age restricted. Lots of young

folks, lots of older folks, and plenty of folks in between, change their lives, their hopes and dreams as they walk with Jesus.

What happened to Matthew? He traveled with Jesus as one of the 12 disciples. He was witness to the agony of Jesus' passion and then was a witness to seeing the resurrected Savior. He is associated with the writing of the Gospel that bears his name. We do not know much more, but tradition has him ministering in Judea and even going on to share the Gospel in Ethiopia and Persia.

Matthew reminds us that Jesus sees us as we are, but also sees what we can be if we follow him. Jesus changes people. He changes all of us!


