It Changed the World!

It Just Might Change You and Me?

You need not be a Christian, nor even believe that God exists, to agree that the first Holy Week changed the world. Jesus of Nazareth entered Jerusalem at the time of Passover. He gave his disciples a meal they called "The Lord's Supper". He was arrested and sentenced to die by the Roman Governor. He was tortured and crucified. His body was buried.

Some of his followers claimed that he rose from the dead on the third day. They said they saw him, talked with him, at one time had a breakfast with him, and this went on for some 50 days before, they said, he ascended back to heaven. They were never the same again.

After a most unusual Pentecost festival event, they felt empowered by what they said was God the Holy Spirit. They began to preach, teach, to live out their faith through acts of love and kindness that amazed others, who then wanted to know more about this Jesus. Many of the first disciples were eventually killed for telling people about Jesus.



Now just about everyone would agree with the first paragraph above. It would also be obvious that the proclamation about Jesus spread, and incredibly this small group grew so much that, almost 2000 years later, (in 2021 to be

exact), it was estimated that the world has 2.38 billion people who say that they are Christians! Christianity is the largest "religion" in the world. How could this happen? Christians would say it was the work of God.

The events of that first Hoy Week have the power to change people, even those who are already Christians. Hardly anyone (even those who do not believe in Jesus) disputes that Jesus of Nazareth died on a cross and was buried. But, for those who believe he rose from the dead and is a living Savior today, well, that has the power to change just about everything we believe about life, about death, about how we are to live today.

Could this Holy Week change you? Could your faith deepen? Could the humility of Jesus on Maundy Thursday challenge us? Could the suffering of Jesus, for you and me and our salvation, change how we view suffering, pain, loss? Could Easter morning look brighter than a "normal day", even if it is pouring down rain? Could the angel's words to the women looking for the body of Jesus, "Why are you looking for the living among the dead? Not here! Risen!" bring a tear, perhaps a sigh, maybe a smile?

Once again this year during Holy Week, there are lots of other things to focus on. Some are very good things. Yet, there is one person and a week's worth of saving events that simply has the power to change our lives and the lives of others that we love. It is one week out of 51 others. Could observing this week be a gift from God to you?





Maundy Thursday

"Given and Shed for You"


Familiar words: Our Lord Jesus on the night he was betrayed..." The Thursday of Holy Week was the night he was betrayed. You know the sentence continues with Jesus taking bread and breaking it; taking wine and passing it around the table. "This is my body", he said. "This is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin." Maundy Thursday is the evening when that happened.

In my experience, many Christian churches outside the Lutheran family do not have Maundy Thursday services. Sometimes the name of the day is even foreign. (Maundy comes from the word for "command". Jesus said, "Do this to remember me.") So perhaps Maundy Thursday is an evening you could invite another Christian friend, not to take them from their own congregation, but just to experience how another part of the body of Christ observes the evening.

Our service is at 6:30 pm. We will be following in Scripture some of the table conversation, as well as the events of that night. There are many themes for the evening, but I think looking at the humility of Jesus is appropriate. That is not a prized character trait in our society today. However, it certainly is one Jesus had, and that he asks his followers to develop as well.

Who invented the Saint Patrick's Day Parade?

<u>Here's looking at you, America</u>. We have a lot to thank Americans for (although we don't always like to admit it) but they are the ones responsible for all this celebrating on March 17, not the Irish.

2 Where was the first Saint Patrick's Day Parade held?



The world's first recorded Saint Patrick's Day Parade took place in *Boston* on March 18, 1737, followed by the New York Parade, which first took place in 1762. Ireland took a while to join in, having their first parade in Dublin in 1931.

What is Saint Patrick's nickname?



Despite what some Americans may tell you, the nickname for Patrick is always Paddy and <u>not</u> Patty. The name Paddy had negative connotations at times in America but you'd never ever hear an Irish person shorten down to Patty instead of Paddy and Saint Paddy's Day or even Paddy's Day is widely used by the Irish back in the Emerald Isle.

Why do we wear green on Saint Patrick's Day?



It's traditional to don some green on March 17 .

The original color associated with St. Patrick was blue but because the Saint preached about the Holy Trinity through the symbol of the shamrock, and the Irish 'little folk' were also associated with green, it became the most common shade in connection with him.

Where was Saint Patrick born?




Nope, not in Ireland! Saint Patrick was born in Wales.

March 29, 2024 at 6:30 pm





